PROJECT GRANT - Panel 1

Marsha Barsky

Marsha Barsky is an Associate Professor and Chair of the Department of Dance at KSU. She has 20 years of experience fostering and implementing creative and educational programs for both the public and private sectors. She is a lifelong learner, who continues to hone her craft by engaging widely with contemporary approaches to dance, somatics, and holistic wellness for dancers and non-dancers. She brings insights from her ongoing research to awaken creative wellbeing and enliven mindful movement practices.

From 2008-2018, she served as director and choreographer for Nashville-based Company Rose. In 2019, she received a Tennessee Arts Commission Individual Fellowship Award for her choreography. As a dancer, she has performed with the Desert Dance Theatre and Shelter Repertory Dance Theatre and in works by Isadora Duncan, Stefanie Batton-Bland, Sean Curren, Bill Evans Pat Graney, Gabriel Masson, Ana Baer, Kim Neal Nofsinger, Ivan Pulinkala and Katherine Duke. Previously, Marsha was an Associate Professor and Director of Dance at Middle Tennessee State University, where she developed Tennessee's first bachelor's degree in Dance, and prior to that, she was the Director of the Vanderbilt University Dance Program. She has taught at numerous venues, festivals, and conferences throughout the US, and in Canada, France, Switzerland, and Spain. In 2017, she was named Foreign Expert in Dance at Chengdu University, Ottawa, and in May 2020 she served as a visiting scholar at the Kroeger College of Public Affairs at Carleton University, Ottawa, Canada.

Marsha received her BFA in Dance from Arizona State University and her MFA in Performance, Choreography, and Somatics from the University of Colorado at Boulder. In 2002, she was certified at the ShambhavAnanda Eldorado yoga teacher training in Boulder, Colorado. In 2011, she graduated from the North Carolina Alexander Technique Program (under the direction of Robin Gilmore), and in 2019 she completed her Gyrokinesis certification in Munstertal, Germany.

Jamie Coffey

Jamie Coffey is delighted to bring her collective experience in the performing arts and nonprofit administration to the Savannah Philharmonic team. Over the past 15 years, Jamie has built her career working with incredible organizations and institutions such as Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater, Barnard College/Columbia University, Ringling College of Art and Design, and Field Arts and Events Hall.

Her passion lies in fostering a strong sense of community and creating access to the arts for all. Jamie holds a master's degree in Performance Studies from NYU Tisch School of the Arts and a B.A. in English from Rollins College. Martín Gendelman

The creative work of composer Martín Gendelman (b.1976) touches on both the acoustic and electronic domains and includes compositions for solo performer, chamber groups, and orchestra, as well as many cross-disciplinary works and installations (primarily with dance, video, and theatre). Over the last 20 years, his music has been performed across the Americas, Europe, and the Middle East by ensembles such as the New York-based Da Capo Chamber Players and Mise-En Ensemble, the Boston New Music Initiative, Meitar Ensemble (Israel), and Galan Trio (Greece), and the Orquesta Sinfónica del Neuquén (Argentina), to name a few. Some of the events in which he has taken part, either as a guest composer or lecturer, include the Festival Forfest in the Czech Republic, CEME New Music Greensboro Festival, Parma Music Festival, and many national and regional conferences of the Society of Composers and the College Music Society in the United States. Gendelman holds a doctoral degree in music composition from the University of Maryland and has served as Co-Director of the Society of Composer's (SCI) Region IV and as Co-Director of the 2016 National Conference of the Society for Electro-Acoustic Music in the United States (SEAMUS). He is currently Associate Professor of Music and Head of Music Theory and Composition at Georgia Southern University, where he also directs the On The Verge new music series.

Melissa Katzin

Melissa Katzin is the Manager of Family Programs and Group Experience at the High Museum of Art, developing programs to show that art is even better when experienced together. She develops and implements family and teen programming, including free family days, early learner programs, and Teen Team, along with out-of-school group experiences. Hillard previously served as Music Director of the St. Joseph Symphony (MO), the Missouri Western Philharmonia, the Meridian Symphony Orchestras (MS), and as a Music Advisor to the Cobb Symphony Orchestra. Grace Cox

Grace Cox is an Atlanta based artist and educator who has been working in art-related nonprofits for over 13 years. Her favorite medium is oil painting, but she also enjoys paper mache, ceramics, and mixed media. Her artwork has been exhibited at the Fort Lauderdale Art Museum, Gallery 216, Storks, Local Three, Spruill Center for the Arts, and others. In March 2022, Grace became the Youth Programs and Community Outreach Manager at Spruill Center for the Arts in Dunwoody Georgia. Since starting, she has increased the revenues from youth programming by 33%, and has created a community where families of all ages and socioeconomic backgrounds feel welcome and encouraged to participate in the arts.

Dr. Larry Dooley

Dr. Larry Dooley is Chair and Professor of Theatre and Dance at Columbus State University. He previously taught at Weber State University (Ogden, Utah) and Northwestern University (Evanston, Illinois). He holds a Ph.D. in Theatre History, Literature and Criticism from Indiana University--Bloomington, a MA from the University of South Carolina, an M.Div. from the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary, and a BA from Newberry College. In addition to teaching Theatre History, Playwriting, Acting, and other courses at CSU, Larry often directs in the theatre season and serves as the Managing Director of Columbus State's Summer Repertory Theatre.

Terry Lowry

Terry Lowry is the composer of over 200 works, including symphonies, concertos, oratorios, chamber works, song cycles and numerous works for solo instruments, especially piano. His iTunes podcast, *Tone Poem*, through which he often releases new compositions, has subscribers in over 100 countries. He was the Georgia Music Teacher Association Commissioned Composer for 2019.

As both pianist and conductor, Mr. Lowry maintains a very busy performing schedule. A Steinway Artist, he has performed over 1000 solo piano recitals throughout North America and Europe and he has appeared on the podium in the United States, Germany, Austria, Spain, and Italy. He is the Conductor and Music Director of the Carroll Symphony Orchestra, the Carrollton Wind Ensemble and the Carrollton Jazz Orchestra. He is also the Organist-Choirmaster at St. Timothy's Episcopal Church in Atlanta, and the pianist of the chamber ensemble Atlanta by Six. His performance repertoire ranges from Thomas Tallis to composers born in the 21st Century, and - harkening back to the days of the composer-virtuoso - he often closes his programs with improvisations on themes provided to him by the audience. He has released 17 albums, including a 2021 recording of Beethoven's *Hammerklavier*.

He is the Executive Producer of the award-winning film (and upcoming docu-series), *Hear Us*, which premiered across North America in 2018, and he worked as producer on over 50 episodes of the syndicated radio program *The Hymn of the Week with Larry Frazier*.
